1) Simple and Compound Sentences

Simple Sentence: A Sentence made up of one subject and one predicate.

Examples:

Mario woke up early this morning.

I ran a 7 seven minute mile.

Tina's books were sitting on her desk.

Compound sentence: A single sentence made by connecting two simple sentences with a comma and a conjunction.

Examples:

Mario woke up early this morning, but he forgot to wake up his younger brother.

I ran a 7 minute mile and Anna ran an 8 minute mile.

Tina's books were sitting on her desk, yet Keshawn couldn't see her anywhere.

2) Standard Capitalization Rules

All of the following require capital letters:

- The first word of complete sentences.
- The pronoun "I"
- All proper nouns
 - Proper nouns are specific people places and things.

- Examples include: names, countries, states, towns, organizations/companies, holidays, languages, months, days of the week, titles

3) Punctuation (End Marks, Commas, Apostrophes)

End Marks: All sentences require end marks.

- Periods (.) - use to end a statement
- Question Mark (?) – use to end a question
- Exclamation Point (!) – use just one to end an exclamation.

Commas: We studied two comma rules this unit

- Commas in Compound Sentences
 - A comma should be use before the conjunction in a compound sentence.
 - (See examples of compound sentences above)
- Commas in a series
 - Commas should be used to separate all items in a series.
 - Examples:
My favorite foods are pizza, chicken fingers, and chocolate pudding.
The Drexel Dragon’s team has brains, perseverance, and kindness.

Apostrophes: We studied two apostrophe rules this unit.

- Apostrophe show possession when combined with an “s”
 - Examples: The teacher’s eye, my dog’s toy, their brother’s school
- Apostrophes are used to combine common words in contractions
 - Examples: can’t, won’t, that’s, should’ve
